# SUMMER SHOW SCHEDULE

- ~ The Hall will open at 8.00am for exhibitors to prepare.
- ~ No entries accepted after 10.30am and exhibits to be displayed by 11.00am.
- ~ Judging will take place between 11.00am and 12.15pm.
- ~ The Hall is open for public viewing from 12.15pm to 1.45pm.
- ~ Top Gardener and Top Dahlia Competition will take place at 1.45pm followed by
- ~ Presentation of Trophies and Prizes by the Mayor, then Raffle.
- ~ Teas and light refreshments will be available.
- ~ Please note the show is a social and fun day so the rules are limited:
  - Entry fee is 20p per class to be paid with completed entry form.
  - No more than one entry per person in any one class is allowed.
  - All exhibits must be grown or made by the exhibitor.
  - The judge's decision is final.
  - Exhibits need not be named although this is preferable.
  - Judges and organisers of the show may enter but are not allowed to judge their own produce.
  - Where a category is entered by only one exhibitor the judges will decide if that entry is worth 1st, 2nd or 3rd. It will not automatically be awarded a 1st.

## Section 1 – Flowers

### Class Number

1. A single dahlia any type in a vase.
2. 3 Dahlias in a vase the same variety (e.g all cactus or all pompom not mixed as in class 3 or 4).
3. 3 Dahlias in a vase of different varieties (e.g, 1 cactus, 1 pompom, 1 dinner plate).
4. A display in a vase of a minimum 6 mixed variety Dahlias.
5. A single flower in a vase any type other than Dahlia.
6. A single gladiolus in a bottle.
7. Three different variety flowers in a vase (excluding Dahlia).
8. Best arrangement of flowers in a vase.
9. A vase of a minimum of 6 sweet peas.
10. Pot plant (indoors).
11. Pot plant (outdoors, no vegetables).
12. Best outdoor vegetable plant in a pot.

## Section 2 – Fruit

### Class Number

13. A plate of mixed fruit (any).
14. A plate of 12 raspberries.
15. A plate of 12 blackberries.
16. A plate of 6 plums.
17. A plate of 6 gages.
18. A plate of currants any colour with a minimum of three strings.
19. Rhubarb - 5 sticks trim leaves to one inch.
20. Any fruit not mentioned above e.g fig, melon, peach, pear gage or Loganberry.

## Section 3 - Weights and Measures

### Class Number

21. Heaviest single Onion (top cut and tied)
22. Heaviest Cabbage (no stalk).
23. Longest Rhubarb Stalk (leaf cut to 1 inch)
24. Heaviest Potato.
25. Heaviest Elephant Garlic.
26. Heaviest Marrow.
27. Heaviest Leek.
28. Heaviest Beetroot.
29. Heaviest Tomato.
30. Heaviest Cucumber.
31. Longest Chilli.
32. Longest Runner Bean.

### Award

A cup or plaque for the winner of each Class.

## Section 4 - Tomatoes and Potatoes

### Class Number

- 33. Potatoes - 4 red matching.
- 34. Potatoes - 4 white matching.
- 35. Potatoes - 4 coloured matching.
- 36. A collection of at least 3 different types of potato on a plate (they do not have to be matching)
- 37. Tomatoes - 6 cherry any variety.
- 38. Tomatoes - 6 medium any variety.
- 39. Tomatoes - 3 large any variety.
- 40. Tomatoes – a plate of 12 any variety.

### Note.

Exhibitors please leave the calyx on the tomatoes.

### Awards

A plaque for 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> on overall points.



## Section 5 - Onion Family

### Class Number

- 41. Onions - 3 red matching.
- 42. Onions - 3 white matching.
- 43. Spring Onions - a bunch of 5.
- 44. Garlic - 2 bulbs.
- 45. Elephant Garlic - 2 bulbs.
- 46. Shallots - 9 in number
- 47. Leeks - 2 matching - leave the flags on and trim the roots to one inch

### Notes

Onions and Shallots may have neck tied down with raffia or twine.

## Section 6 - Leafy Vegetables

### Class Number

- 48. Kale – bunch, tied, mixed or single variety.
- 49. Sweetcorn - 2 large cobs (peel back one leaf).
- 50. Cabbage - with all leaves on and root cut to four inches.
- 51. Tied bunch of chard of any type - minimum of 6 leaves.  
(May be displayed in Jar/Vase)

A cup for highest overall points overall in Class.

## Section 7 – Peas, Beans, Aubergine and Peppers

### Class Number

- 52. Chilli Peppers - 6 matching.
- 53. Peppers - 2 matching.
- 54. A plate of up to 12 mixed Chilli/Peppers with minimum two varieties.
- 55. Runner Beans - 5 matching.
- 56. French Beans - 5 matching.
- 57. Any other bean not mentioned x 5 (Broad, Borlotti)
- 58. Aubergines – 2 matching

### Awards

A cup for highest overall points overall in Class.

A cup for "Best in Section".



## Section 8 - The Cucurbit Family

### Class Number

- 59. Cucumber, short - 2 matching.
- 60. Cucumber, long - 2 matching.
- 61. A pair of marrows (appearance is the key not size)
- 62. Courgettes - 2 matching any type
- 63. Squash 1 any type

### Awards

A cup for highest overall points in Section.

## Section 9 - The Root Family

### Class Number

- 64. Carrots - 3 long
- 65. Carrots - 3 other than long
- 66. Beetroot large - 3 round, matching.
- 67. Beetroot long - 3 long, matching.
- 68. Beetroot small - 3 round matching.
- 69. Beetroot – a plate of 6 mixed.

### Notes

All root vegetables must be clean from soil and virus free. Leaves are to be trimmed to one inch and may be tied with raffia or twine.

### Awards

A cup for highest overall points overall in Class and a cup for "Best in Section".



## Section 10 - Miscellaneous

### Class Number

- 70. An arrangement of comical vegetables.
- 71. A misshapen or distorted vegetable.
- 72. Any other plate/head of vegetable or fruit not mentioned in schedule.  
Such as, radish, celery, celeriac and Kohlrabi.

### Award

A Cup for Classes 70 and 71.

## Section 11 – Arrangements

### Class Number

- 73. A Trug with a minimum of 10 items.
- 74. A mushroom box with a minimum of 10 and a maximum of 15 items (may include more than one of same variety, or 15 individual items).
- 75. A growing arrangement of mixed herbs.
- 76. A tied bunch of mixed herbs (may be in water in Jar/Vase).
- 77. A collection of 5 different types of fruit and vegetables displayed on a board 18 inches wide x 24 inches deep, provided. May include multiple fruit or veg on a single vine or stem.

### Awards

A cup for 1<sup>st</sup> place in classes 74, 75 and 78.

### Class Number

- 78. An arrangement of flowers any type in a vase.
- 79. Pot plant any type.
- 80. Best vegetable animal or person.
- 81. Best miniature garden made in a seed tray (any size).
- 82. Best distorted vegetable.

A plaque for 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> places overall.

A Cup for the best child's miniature garden.
